What a great day we had for our Feast Day!



Has your child been struggling with emotions?

Have you seen an increase in tantrums or big emotions?

Does your child express their emotions?

Is your child struggling to bounce back from a strong emotional situation?


Are you seeing different behaviours in your child?

It's never too early to teach your child about emotions.

By learning about emotions and feelings, children are better able to use words to express how they are feeling rather than acting out. Social-emotional learning is important for young people. Children tend to learn things quickly and naturally. They learn through watching others and seeing how they respond and then mimicking those responses.

Some tips and ideas to help children learn about emotions:

- Express emotions by speaking clearly and using appropriate language
- Explain how you are feeling by using words appropriate to their level and age. Try using books and stories to help do this
- Each morning try to spend 5 minutes modelling different kinds of emotions through facial expressions and body language. Help teach your child to identify emotions in others
- Teach your children to use I feel...statements, this helps to teach them conflict resolution skills
- Teach your child emotional rights, it is important that they understand and can assert their rights when it comes to emotions, this helps with boundaries



- Children learn to embrace emotions when they understand that it is ok to feel the way they do
- Help your child express their emotions appropriately, journaling might be a useful tool for them to express how they feel
- Encourage a positive mindset. Teach them positive self-talk. Practice mindfulness strategies, there are many useful apps and videos on YouTube. Do a "My love map" with your child where you both draw things in a heart shape that you love
- Play is important for all areas of children's development, including emotional development. Ideas could include drawing, reading, messy plans, or pretend play.




SPORT NEWS

1 Red


To extend students in their writing we have been using conjunctions to add ideas to our sentences, making them more complex and interesting. This also encourages students to expand their thinking and add detail to their writing to engage their audience. Students are also being extended by identifying parts of speech, such as verbs, nouns and adjectives within sentences.



2 Red

For mathematics in 2 Red, we are learning how to expand our mathematical thinking by using a range of strategies to solve addition problems. A strategy we have been learning to use is the formal written algorithm. The work sample below shows the learner's knowledge being extended through the incorporation of regrouping.





STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

This week marks the third week of our school wide focus on Narrative Writing through the Seven Steps. In this short period of time, we have witnessed our students not only produce fantastic pieces of writing, but engage in lessons with eagerness and enthusiasm. Having our families discuss writing ideas and topics through the Big Talk each week is proving to be extremely beneficial, with our students arriving at school on a Friday morning excited about the opportunity to engage in their weekly Big Write. Attached are our parent tips for Step 2: Sizzling Starts and Step 3: Tightening Tension. We encourage you to have a conversation with your child about these writing strategies to continue fostering the connection between home and the classroom.

STEP 2: sizzling starts

Seven Steps Writing Tips for Families



Children often start their stories at the beginning of the day, the start of the week or even the first day of the school holidays. We want to encourage them to start where the action is or at a moment of change. We call this technique 'Sizzling Starts'.

Writer's have approximately 7 seconds to capture the reader's attention. We want our students to begin in the action and add the details (backfill) as the story progresses.

What can you do at home to support planning?

Next time you are watching a movie with your children, talk about how the movie begins with lots of action to grab your attention. Action movies (e.g. James Bond) are especially good at this.

This works for books, too. Next time you begin a new book, talk about how the beginning hooks you in and makes the reader want more!

Before: I leapt out of bed that morning and hurried to get dressed because today Dad was taking us to the zoo. I was really excited because they have this big monkey enclosure there and I am mad about monkeys. I also needed to get some really good photos for my science project.

The before example wastes time with boring detail before the zoo. See how the after example gets straight into the action?

After: 'Here,' I told my sister, 'hold my backpack. I'm just going to get a bit closer to the monkey's cage.'

A bit closer meant over the fence, past the 'No Entry' sign and right up to the wire. 'You're monkey mad,' said my sister. Well, maybe I was, but I was also desperate for an A in my latest science project. A picture of a cute monkey, smiling right at the camera, would make all the difference, right?

TOP TIP

Encourage your children to start their stories right where the action begins. This can be done by starting with a sound, an action or dialogue. This will make the story far more interesting.










STEP 3: tightening tension

Seven Steps Writing Tips for Families



In writing, the tension scene comes just before the big climax at the end of the story. In movies this is the scene of the soccer final, the exciting car chase or the heroine fighting for her life in a raging river. Great tension scenes should be strong and long.

The tension scene builds up through the pebble, rock and boulder. Writers can use their 5 senses + 1 (what they can see, hear, touch, taste, smell and feel) to make the reader feel like they are right there with the character!

action activities

What can you do at home to support tightening tension?

Read picture books with your children and look for tension scenes. Picture books are short, so it's easy to find where the all-important tension builds before the ending. Here are some suggestions to get you started: The Gruffalo, Wombat Stew, The Three Little Pigs, Hansel and Gretel.

We all know the tension scene in Little Red Riding Hood. Little Red Riding Hood arrives at the cottage and the wolf is in bed in Granny's clothes. Little Red Riding Hood (who obviously needs glasses!) says:

Oh, Grandmother, what big ears you have!'
'All the better to hear you with.'

'Oh, Grandmother, what big eyes you have!'
'All the better to see you with.'

'Oh, Grandmother, what big hands you have!'
'All the better to hold you with.'

'Oh, Grandmother, what big teeth you have!'
'All the better to EAT YOU WITH!'

See how the scene slowly builds up to be more and more dangerous – and thus frightening? We don't start with the teeth, we start with the ears and the wolf trying to coax Little Red Riding Hood to come nearer and nearer.



Emotion always takes time to build up, so in tension scenes remember to start small and 'escalate' to a powerful climax.

Encourage your children to brainstorm ideas using the 5 senses + 1 technique before they begin writing
